I ended up in Charleston for a couple of days not too long ago. A couple of high school friends of mine, after all these years, decided they wanted to marry each other on the beach at Kiawah Island. So, I tripped over to hitch 'em. While I was there, I picked up one of those Visitors' Guides from the Department of Tourism. And, I found an ad. It called attention to the many things to do while in the Charleston area. With so much to do and so little time, how's one to know where to start? Do what the locals do, the ad encouraged. Follow the "never-fail plan." Ready for the plan?

"Stroll. Explore. Browse. Taste. See. Do. Snooze. Repeat."

As I pondered that plan, I came to like it. And, I came to hear in that plan echoes of a plan that's good for all of us, anywhere, anytime.

Stroll. We often run, blitz, screech, fly, rush, hustle, ninety-going-north. There's something about a stroll. A walk. It's sometimes good to stroll with someone else, to share and to listen and to ponder. I hope you'll stroll sometime soon. For pell-mell, helter-skelter folks like you and me, it's a good thing.

Explore. We like it safe. We stay right here. Not geographically so much. Mentally. Emotionally. Psychologically. Theologically. So many of us made up our minds about things so long ago that new insights, new possibilities, new ideas, new thoughts about things don't know they have an inn with us where they may visit and even stay. When's the last time you intentionally read a book or sought to learn something that is completely outside your zone of safety? There's a big ol' world out there,

waiting for us to explore it. And, within ourselves, deep in the dark moisture of our souls, is an even larger inner world, which we often leave unexplored. Strike out. It's a good thing.

Browse. See "Stroll." We're much too hurried and often much too impulsive to browse. And, when I say "Browse," I don't so much mean over the jeans or the decorative touches for our homes. Browse is related to "Explore." There's so much to touch, to try on, to notice. Browse-ful exploration can be the wonderful antidote to our sameness.

Taste. Experience is to be savored. There's so much bounty, so much flavor, in what we experience each day. I do know that it's difficult to savor experiences that are unpleasant or characterized by suffering or struggle. But, so many of us miss our lives, because we're on the way, often quickly, to the next moment, to the next thing. Taste today, with what bitterness or joy or sadness or gladness it brings. In that taste of life is something dear.

See. John Newton was willing to see, as you recall from his now-famous words. "I was blind, but now I see." But, seeing.... There's a price tag on that. Seeing costs us some of our dearly-held opinions about things. That's why the preacher in Ecclesiastes says that ignorance is bliss. Sight is pretty expensive. Because, there's no seeing without change, without movement. I can't recall where, or even the name of the people, but there is an indigenous culture somewhere on the planet where the people greet one another in this way. "Here I am," one person says, to which the other responds, "I see you." Wow. What would we see, just within our own circle, if we really opened our eyes?

Might we see the "glimpses of truth" God has for us, as that old hymn wonders?

Do. We've all heard about good intentions. I wish I received credit for all that I had hoped to do, wanted to do, intended to do. Unfortunately, the world is made better only by what we actually do, the justice work in which we actually engage ourselves. If you're like me, there's something you know you've been called to do, and it's still undone.

Snooze. In the Bible, they call this "Sabbath." See "Stroll." Sabbath ain't for busy people, who think that the world depends upon their busy activity. I recall one mentor of mine saying once that "busyness is essentially laziness." I think that's true. It's easier to run than to rest. Because, in the rest is the still, small voice, that calls and beckons us, that redirects and reproves us, that moves and changes us. And, we often drown it out. Not to mention the toughness of these times, and how important it is for us to rest and re-create. I hope you're finding time to do that.

Repeat. If this is a "never-fail plan," I suspect it's worth repeating.

I hope your summer's going well. Know that I love you.

On the Financial Side...

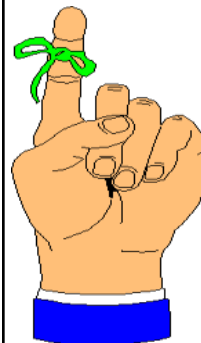
June 2010 puts us at the halfway point for the year. Our \$834,000 annual budget for 2010 calls for \$417,000 for the first six months of 2010. We have only received \$390,000 June year-to-date, yielding a shortfall of (\$27,000).

June 2010 contributions were \$60,164.38 and expenses were \$73,635.44, resulting in a net loss of (\$13,471.06). The Line of Credit (LOC) balance for June 30, 2010 remains at \$117,772.52. On a Year-to-date basis, net contributions are \$390,112.32 and expenses are \$390,703.08, resulting in a net loss of (\$590.76).

A Recap

Editor's Note: Tracy Carpenter and I had the joy and pleasure to serve as class leaders for the VBS Xtreme group. This bright and enthusiastic group of rising 5th and 6th graders came to Vacation Bible School armed with a good grasp and understanding of the lessons we taught throughout the week. Xtreme participant Lacey Shaffer provided the following "diary" of what she and her peers learned during our Galactic Blast VBS.

This years VBS theme was Galactic Blast – A Cosmic Adventure Praising God. On Monday morning, our space commander, “Commander Cool”, introduced us to Galileo the green gorilla, who thought he was the smartest gorilla in astronaut school! We learned about the creation of the universe and how in just six days God created the entire world. We talked about ways to take care of the Earth.



Our second mission was to Mount Horeb where we met Elijah hiding in a cave at the top of the mountain. God came to speak to Elijah. Elijah experienced a strong wind, an earthquake and a roaring fire, but God did not speak through any of these. God spoke to Elijah in a still, small voice and told him there were still people who believed. Our space connection on the second mission taught the cadets about the moon. We learned that the moon never leaves the earth’s side. Even when we can’t see the moon, it is always near Earth. We must remember that God never leaves us. God is always near us, hearing our prayers and ready to help us.

That afternoon 60 kids and 20 chaperones went to the Agnes Scott College Planetarium. They learned about constellations and planets. They got to look at a telescope and make fun star charts. Madelyn Shaffer says “The Planetarium was one of my favorite parts of the week.”

Our third mission took us to Samaria where Jesus stopped by a well for a drink of water. He met a woman at the well and spoke to her. Jesus knew all about her even though she didn’t know him at all. When she learned that he was God’s son, she praised him by bringing others to learn more about him. The space connection taught us that God created all the stars and put each one in place. God gave all the stars a name and He knows each one by name. God knows each one of us too!



Our fourth mission took us on the road to Jericho. As Jesus traveled to Galilee there was a blind beggar by the side of the road. When the beggar heard the crowd gathering, he asked who was coming. Someone told him that it was Jesus and the blind man began to shout for him. Others told him to be quiet but Jesus asked that someone bring the blind beggar to him. The blind man wanted Jesus to let him see again and Jesus healed him. After seeing the miracle, the crowd started to praise God. Our space connection taught us that comets burn brightly when they are near the sun. Like comets, when we are close to God, we can shine like a comet.



Our fifth and final mission took us to Emmaus. Two disciples were traveling and Jesus began to walk with them, but the disciples did not recognize him. They told Jesus about everything that had happened in Jerusalem over the last few days. Jesus told them about the scriptures and they asked him to stay for dinner. As Jesus blessed the food, the two disciples recognized him and he vanished. They returned to Jerusalem to tell others what had happened.

In VBS this week, we learned that God never leaves our side and we should stay close to God through prayer and studying His word. We also learned that we should take care of God’s creation since He made it all for us to enjoy! Our God is wonderful, incredible, amazing, magnificent and awesome....Praise GOD!
